We'll, it's time to start winding down. It's been quite a year... it started with trying to find a new general manager, a task that literally kept me up at night. Luckily I was able to lure Maddie back, and from there we were able to hire enough licensed staff to keep our launches running. The US Coast Guard had some problem getting the licenses processed, but ultimately all was resolved.

Then came December 23rd, and the significant damage to the deck and porch. We all know how that ended up being resolved, and I think we can agree that it was a significant upgrade to the facilities.

Many issues were resolved with little fanfare, including upgrading the equipment in the launches to comply with US Coast Guard regulations, enrolling our staff in a federally mandated random drug testing program, and having the USCG inspect our launches as Uninspected Passenger Vessels to insure that they complied with all federal regulations.

It's amazing to learn how many local, state and federal regulations our little club is subject to, and complying with them can sometimes be frustrating. It's also sometimes difficult to keep up with all the repairs and maintenance necessary to keep the club functioning. Some of those things included replacing the freezer, repairing leaks in the kitchen, adding a timer to the front spotlight, replacing some of the defective equipment on the launches, etc.

Frankly, it was a lot of work, but I enjoyed every minute of it. I'm grateful to all of you who recognized the work that was done.

SAILING MISTRAL

Update from Carl and Betsy Stevens

Sailing along the southern coast of Sardinia we noticed a strange vision in the distance. It appeared to be a wall of white caps. I said, "Hmmm...must be the mistral starting out there. Interesting. " Just a few minutes later the wall of white started to get closer. "Hmmm...it's getting closer." "Oh look. You can see the wind coming over the water towards us. "Within seconds we were enveloped in 35 knot gusts. The Mistral arrived early from a different direction that was predicted. We dashed behind a headland, anchored, and waited for the wind direction to change. A few hours later we were able to head to the safe anchorage where we had first intended to go. We sat there safely for three days, while the

Mistral howled. Now we know what we're facing when a mistral is predicted!

We just returned from a visit to Tunisia to see the ruins at Carthage, and now we're headed up the East coast of Sardinia. In September we will be working our way back to Gibraltar in order to head to the Canary Islands in November. From there we will cross the Atlantic again to the Caribbean for the winter.

*A mistral is a strong wind that blows down the French alps into the Mediterranean. It is rare to have such a strong mistral in July
