View from the Bridge Commodore Dan Gingras





January 13th, 2024 was another disaster day for Portsmouth Yacht Club as a spring tide coupled with a storm center drove water high into the clubhouse for the first time. Water was 17" over the deck, and approximately 13" up the side door opening onto the deck. Luckily this door held back most of the water with just a small amount leaking underneath. Unfortunately, it was enough to soak the carpets and submerge part of the dance floor. I was called by Soni Christensen early as the water rose and was able to drive through standing water near the Wentworth to get to the club as the water continued to rise, however as the water continued to rise, I was trapped on the island. I was able to recover some of the floating items such as propane tanks and some of the mooring balls which were secured. I immediately notified our insurance agent and called Insurcomm, a remediation company, to get the proper equipment in place to dehumidify the club and add heaters. I also documented as much as I could with photos for our insurance claim. At 16:13 Insurcomm arrived with a bunch of equipment, and Rear Commodore Whit Weller came to help remove some of the standing water with wet/dry vacs. We also put out a call for volunteers to begin cleanup on the 14th of January. The response was fantastic, and we were able to remove everything from the first floor and move it to the second floor. A very big thank you to all of the members who responded. Insurcomm also connected electric heaters to warm the building to help with the dehumidification. It is possible that we may find further damage as we open the club, since the water heater was flooded and there was substantial movement of the floor as waves flooded under the building. In addition, there was substantial water in the shed. The good news is that despite waves crashing into the building and damaging the porch windows, the new deck did not move. We did, however, lose the ramp to the side access to the deck.

We were not the only organization in the harbor who suffered some damage. The Coast Guard station had significant damage to their boathouse, so much so that it was rendered unusable. Maddie was contacted by the Executive Petty Officer Tim Leyland and forwarded me his contact information. When contacted he explained that their 32' rescue boat did not have a place out of which to operate and wondered if we might have some room for them. Realizing that this was a critical asset to the maritime community, I contacted Rear Commodore Whit Weller who worked to rearrange the dock to make space for their boat, and negotiated a contract with them to allow them to rent a slip from which to respond to emergencies. We all should be proud of PYC's work to insure that boaters will be safe this summer.

We're going to have a lot of work to do to get the club open and move all the equipment we stored upstairs back in place. I have no doubt that the PYC community will be there at Docks In to get things ship shape.

Cleanup Crew, January 14, 2024

The preparations for the 2024 season are under way. There have been several significant events to report for January and February. But the first order of business is to say how pleased I am to have Maddie return as our club Steward and General Manager. Maddie has hired Adam Shapiro to be Dockmaster and the team has started to fill the staff requirement. Comm. Gingras and I have been working closely to bring together all of the aspects necessary to fulfill our wish to prepare PYC for the spring opening.

January brought a water event that caused some damage to the clubhouse. Dan and I worked diligently to clear the inundated floor of water. We wet-vac'ed and brought in a water mitigation and recovery company called Insurcomm to assist in de-humidification and moisture removal. We succeeded to remove most of the water in an attempt to save the carpet and floor from damage. The storm surge broke into the screen porch doing some damage to panels and screens, the fuel sump cover was lost and floated away down river and the entry walk way on the south side had the ramp washed away.

We were fortunate that our new appliances, both refrigeration and freezers were spared any harm. The clubhouse itself did not suffer any damage to the main structure which is due to the investment the membership made to tie the house undercarriage to concrete footings. A big thanks goes out to the 40 or more members who answered the call to move all the goods stored in the house to the second floor or out in the yard so we could dry out the carpets and floor. Comm. Gingras has contacted our insurance team and assessors have inspected the property. The good news is we believe we can pull all the pieces together and meet our scheduled opening for the first week of May.

The tank fuel tank replacement committee met with the engineering firm and reviewed plans for re-building the south walkway (probably Spring '25) An assessment has been done on necessary fastener and stringer repairs to some of our floats.

The United States Coast Guard, Portsmouth Harbor Group had damage to their boathouse and dock system during the Jan 13th storm. As a result they have asked PYC if we could rent them a slip until repair has been accomplished. We have finalized a lease agreement to let them use Slip "M" to dock their 32' Rapid Response Boat for the '24 season. Thanks go out to Capt. Jelmberg for making slip "M" available. The club membership and the USCG owe Jim a hearty thank you for his sacrifice for the USCG.

I will be convening a meeting with the House and Docks committee to organize repairs to the south boardwalk ramp and other house and dock repairs.

SAILING MISTRAL Update from Carl and Betsy Stevens

February 11, 2024

Greetings PYC friends. We departed Canary Islands at the end of November and stopped in the Cape Verde Islands for refueling after several days of calm. Then it was off for our second Atlantic crossing with 2 friends helping as crew. The trade winds were fairly light. Nonetheless, we had some drama as expected. At one point during a night of shifty winds, when taking the main down, a gust broke the clew line holding the sail to the in-boom roller furling. The strain on the foot of the sail caused it to rip off the boom. Carl was able to sew up the tear, and we got the main back on the boom three days later when the conditions had quieted. Another time of anxiety happened when we noticed that a strand of wire on each of two different shrouds had parted. Fortunately,

that was more towards the end of the crossing, so Carl re-enforced the two shrouds, and we made it safely to Martinique. Martinique had excellent yacht facilities, so we had the standing rigging replaced at a reasonable price. Currently, we are in Antigua working our way up the Leeward Island chain. We will be in the US Virgin Islands and British Virgin Islands in a couple of weeks for the month of March. Then we'll be heading to the Bahamas and up the East Coast. If any members happen to be in the area, email us so we can enjoy a sundowner together!
